Resident 1 Reference Committee Report

- 1 The Resident 1 Reference Committee has considered each of the items referred to it and
- 2 submits the following report. The committee's recommendations will be submitted as a
- 3 consent calendar and voted on in one vote. Any item or items may be extracted for
- 4 debate.

ITEM NO. 1: RESOLUTION NO. R1-101: Addressing Weight Bias in the Clinical Setting

RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians recognize weight bias as a form of discrimination that can have serious health consequences for patients who are considered overweight or obese; and be it further

 RESOLVED, that the American Academy of Family Physicians develop educational resources for family physicians and medical trainees addressing weight bias and its health consequences, including guidance on how to communicate effectively and respectfully with patients who are overweight/obese to avoid causing harm.

The reference committee heard testimony only in support of this resolution. Those who testified stated that weight bias is not explicitly mentioned in any AAFP policy, and that AAFP should address weight bias and its consequences as a form of discrimination. There was also testimony expressing concern about use of the phrase "overweight/obese" within the resolution and recommended the use of preferred terminology such as "excess weight."

The reference committee had robust discussion regarding whether the existing policy statement on patient discrimination is explicit in identifying the health consequences of weight bias. The reference committee learned from staff about current AAFP activities and projects underway to develop a practice manual that will address weight bias and its health consequences, including guidance on how to communicate effectively and respectfully with patients who are clinically overweight or obese. The reference committee also learned that AAFP has a comprehensive continuing medical education course on obesity that is currently being updated. The course includes a session specific to weight bias. The weight bias session is also available free via the *Family Practice Management* Quick Tips blog. The reference committee ultimately recommended to reaffirm the resolution as current policy.

RECOMMENDATION: The reference committee recommends that Resolution No. R1-101 be reaffirmed as current policy.

ITEM NO. 2: RESOLUTION NO. R1-102: International Medical Graduate (IMG) in Family Medicine

RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physician develop resources to help advertise and provide information about programs that are International Medical Graduate friendly, and be it further help advertise residency programs who match the highest rates of international medical graduates (IMGs) in the AAFP Residency Directory to help IMGs applying to family medicine more efficiently identify programs who are IMG-friendly.

RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians create an International Medical Graduate (IMG) committee to support the IMG interested in applying to a family medicine residency.

The reference committee heard testimony only in support of the resolution. Testimony focused on the overall difficulty of navigating the application process for residency programs as an international medical graduate (IMG) and the challenges faced by IMGs trying to identify residency programs in the U.S. Those testifying discussed limited availability of free resources to identify residency programs that are more welcoming to IMGs and offer additional support, such as visa sponsorship. They also discussed the importance of IMGs to workforce diversity in family medicine.

The reference committee discussed the importance of addressing the many challenges faced by IMGs applying for family medicine residencies, and the stigma and bias often experienced by IMGs during the application process. The reference committee also discussed the many resources already developed by the AAFP to help address some of these challenges, including the work of the IMG constituency of the National Conference of Constituency Leaders, online resources for navigating the residency application process as an IMG, the creation of a Family Medicine Interest Group (FMIG) IMG coordinator position, and an online IMG community. The reference committee was supportive of the intent of the resolution and acknowledged that the AAFP provides support to IMGs in a variety of ways, but concern was expressed about the vagueness of the resolution in identifying what makes a residency program "IMG-friendly." The reference committee ultimately recommended the resolution not be adopted.

RECOMMENDATION: The reference committee recommends that Resolution No. R1-102 not be adopted. EXTRACTED. ADOPTED AS AMENDED ON THE FLOOR.

ITEM NO. 3: RESOLUTION No. R1-103: Promoting Climate-Friendly Healthcare

RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians promote research, advocacy, and actions toward reducing the impact of the health care industry on climate change.

The reference committee only heard testimony in support of the resolution. This testimony included a call to notice a gap in the existing AAFP policy, "Environmental Health and Climate Change," on healthcare as a contributor to climate change, and that health systems should work to reduce climate impacts. The testimony provided also called attention to the responsibility of family medicine physicians to advocate for more comprehensive education on climate change, as family physicians will be caring for patients living with the effects of climate change.

The reference committee discussion focused on how information exists covering how climate change impacts overall health, but there is limited focus on how healthcare can impact climate change. The reference committee was informed about the position paper in development on Climate Change and Environmental Health: A Family Medicine Perspective, and the opportunity to include this perspective into the content of the paper.

RECOMMENDATION: The reference committee recommends that Resolution No. R1-103 be adopted.
