R3-601	<p>Creating an AAFP Minority Pipeline Program RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians develop a professional and leadership development program incorporating additional elements including, but not limited to, formal mentorship opportunities, leadership training, and networking opportunities for underrepresented minority students and residents.</p>	Commission on Education	<p>Agree (with recommendation to the Board)</p> <p>Directed AAFP staff to create a pathway into and through the many opportunities available for students underrepresented in medicine. Recommend to target students as early as possible during medical school to get engaged with their FMIG and the AAFP, and to make them aware of the many leadership and networking opportunities that the AAFP offers, including the discussion group and programming at NC, minority delegate opportunities, online communities, Member Interest Groups, the AAFP Foundation Emerging Leaders Institute, and the leadership positions available. Also, staff committed to enhancing current web content for minority medical students to provide more resources and direction for students to build their leadership skills and experience.</p>

Commission Membership and Member Services	Agree with Modification The commission was in support of creating a "Transitional" membership category which would allow any Student member who has not matched into an accredited family medicine residency program the opportunity to continue their AAFP membership for a maximum of two years after the year they completed medical school.

Commission on Education	Accept for Information A similar resolution was proposed and not adopted by the Student Congress in 2017. At this time, without support of the Student Congress, staff sees no need for action.
R3-605	Improving Feedback on Student/Resident Resolutions RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians explore the development of an online resource summarizing downstream actions and appropriate staff contact information related to all adopted resolutions from the National Congress of Student Members and the National Congress of Family Medicine Residents.	Commission on Education	Accept for Information A nearly identical resolution was submitted to the NCSM in 2010. Noted then and still true today is that it is likely that AAFP staff would need to devote considerable time to convert this information from the current format to a searchable database. Given the current number and volume of IT projects, it is likely that this request would be given lower priority. Currently, the past actions of the Resident and Student Congresses (1975-present) are available through a searchable PDF document that is posted on the NC website.

R3-607	Encouraging Holistic Selection of FM Residency Applicants RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians create a policy statement encouraging residency programs to utilize a more holistic method of selecting applicants to interview that does not overutilize the United States Medical Licensing Exam Step 1 or Step 2 scores or COMLEX scores, but also consider life experiences, educational background, and socioeconomic status of the applicants.	Commission on Education	Accept for Information The AAFP should not be mandating by way of policy the way programs select their applicants. Overall, there are more appropriate bodies like AFMRD to address the issue of using board exam pass rates in the accreditation evaluation of residency programs.

R3-608	Support Reproductive Health Education RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians National Conference of Family Medicine Residents and Medical Students Planning Committee support and encourage inclusion of reproductive health topics such as contraception, abortion, miscarriage, and options counseling for unintended pregnancy, as well as procedural topics such as intrauterine device insertion, uterine aspiration, and implant insertion at the meeting.	Commission on Education	Consistent with Current Policy Contraception and other women's health topics are included on the suggested topics list that is shared with potential workshop presenters. Women's Health Techniques is offered on an annual basis as a Procedural Skills Course, which describes and demonstrates IUD insertion. In 2017, seven workshop proposals on the topic were submitted, three of which were deemed by the committee to be duplicative with the Procedural Skills Course. The committee selected a proposal they thought was most applicable to the National Conference audience.
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
