



SOUTH CAROLINA FACT SHEET

AAFP on Health Reform

The AAFP believes that policies should be adopted to ensure continued progress towards health care for all supported by a payment system that rewards value over volume of service. The health system should promote prevention and wellness, protect patients from financial barriers to needed services and build a primary care physician workforce that can meet the growing demand for care. South Carolina Family Medicine

- There are 1,600 family physicians in South Carolina.
- South Carolina has 8 family medicine residency programs.
- South Carolina has 79 medically underserved areas/populations.
- 5.7% of the residents in South Carolina live in a health professional shortage area.

Medicaid in South Carolina

- In 2015, 19% of people in South Carolina were covered by Medicaid/CHIP.
- Medicaid/CHIP enrollment increased by 108,900 between 2013 and 2016.
- South Carolina's uninsured rate decreased from 16% in 2013 to 11% in 2015.
- In South Carolina, 75% of adult and child Medicaid enrollees live in households with at least one worker.
- In South Carolina, 34% of Medicaid spending is for Medicare beneficiaries.¹

Impact of Health Reform Repeal with no Replacement in South Carolina

- 353,000 people in the state of South Carolina would lose their health coverage.²
- Loss of \$11.7 billion in federal funding.
 - Federal marketplace spending on South Carolina would decrease by \$951 million in 2019 and \$10.6 billion between 2019 and 2028.
 - Federal Medicaid funding in South Carolina would decrease by \$88 million in 2019 and \$1.1 billion between 2019 and 2028.³
- In South Carolina, 822,000 non-elderly adults have a declinable preexisting condition
 - This represents 28% of non-elderly adults in the state.⁴
- In South Carolina, the cost of uncompensated care would increase by \$655 million.⁵
