What is Boot Camp Translation?

BCT is a process that translates medical information and clinical guidelines into concepts, messages, and materials that are understandable, meaningful, and engaging to community members and can be implemented and tested. BCT is a reliable method for long-term community-academic partnerships.

Who Should Attend Training?

- ◆ Academic health researchers, research team members, & community members. Junior faculty or early career researchers are especially encouraged to attend.
- ◆ Beginner to advanced experience with community-based participatory research and/or community engagement experience.
- ◆ Intermediate to advanced facilitation skills (small to medium group sizes).
