Re: Oil and Gas Production Safety Systems—Revisions, 1014–AA37

Dear Deputy Assistant Secretary MacGregor:

On behalf of the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP), which represents 129,000 family physicians and medical students across the country, I write in response to the "Oil and Gas and Sulphur Operations on the Outer Continental Shelf—Oil and Gas Production Safety Systems—Revisions" proposed rule published by the Bureau of Safety and Environmental Enforcement (BSEE) in the December 29, 2017 Federal Register.

The AAFP is concerned that these proposed revisions aim to amend needed and important safety regulations regarding oil and natural gas production. We oppose discontinuation of safety regulations enacted to prevent future accidents and harms to humans, wildlife, and the environment. Immediate health consequences of accidents related to oil and natural gas production include but are not limited to preventable injuries and death, and exposure to hazardous chemical toxins leading to acute toxicity affecting multiple organ systems. This acute toxicity can lead to chronic, long-term health effects. There are also short and long-term psychological consequences associated with accidents related to oil and natural gas production including generalized anxiety disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder and depressive symptoms.

In recognition of the numerous and serious adverse health consequences resulting from pollution, greenhouse emissions from human activities, climate change and ozone layer depletion, the AAFP policy on Climate Change and Air Pollution recommends strong action on all public and private levels to limit and correct the pollution of our land, atmosphere and water.

We are concerned that removing the required third-party inspection of devices could cause avoidable accidents, death, short and long-term negative health effects and pollution. We therefore urge BSEE to not revise these proposed changes.
