New Physicians 9 Joyce Roberts, MD, Minority 10 Laura Kaplan-Weisman, MD, LGBT 11 Casey Henritz, DO, Women 12 13 WHEREAS, The mission of the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) is to improve the 14 health of patients, families, and communities by serving the needs of members with 15 professionalism and creativity, and 16 17 WHEREAS, the AAFP encourages all physicians, including women, to participate actively in all 18 AAFP programs and activities and at all levels of leadership, and 19 20 WHEREAS, meetings such as AAFP Family Medicine Experience (FMX) and Congress of 21 Delegates (CoD) provide important opportunities for career development, education, and 22 networking, and 23 24 WHEREAS, women's careers are disproportionately affected by the lack of childcare services and 25 facilities, and 26 27 WHEREAS, the American Medical Association (AMA), American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), 28 and American Congress of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) annual meetings offer on-29 site child care services, and 30 31 WHEREAS, the AAFP advocates for the removal of barriers to breastfeeding including 32 encouraging breastfeeding-friendly workplaces and protecting the right to breastfeed in public, 33 now, therefore, be it 34 35 RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians work with the hotels that host our 36 Continuing Medical Education meetings to provide a lactation lounge with basic services including 37 privacy, running water, and refrigerated milk storage, and is not in a restroom, and be it further 38 39 RESOLVED. That the National Conference of Constituency Leaders (NCCL) bring a resolution to 40 the AAFP CoD to direct the AAFP to adjust its recommendations regarding children at AAFP 41 meetings from "Out of consideration for others, please do not bring children to CME events" to 42 "AAFP supports families. Please use your best judgment regarding bringing children to CME 43 events", and be it further 44 45 RESOLVED, That the AAFP provide an on-site play area for children and their caregivers at 46 AAFP FMX and CoD, and be it further 47 48 RESOLVED, That the AAFP provide free or subsidized on-site child care services at NCCL, AAFP 49 FMX and CoD, and be it further 50

1 Resolution NO. 4003 2 3 Inclusion of Residents in American Academy of Family Physicians Supporting 4 Membership 5 6 Submitted by: Rachel Franklin, MD, FAAFP, Women 7 Erika Roshanravan, MD, General Registrant 8 Tessa Rohrberg, MD, New Physicians 9 10 WHEREAS, Currently supporting members of the American Academy of Family Physicians 11 (AAFP) are physicians who are residency trained in a specialty other than family medicine and 12 supportive of the mission and goals of the AAFP, and 13 14 WHEREAS, there are residents in other specialties who would like to enrich and enhance the 15 specialty by investing in family medicine with a supporting membership, and 16 17 WHEREAS, there may be international family physicians who are already family medicine 18 trained who subsequently match into specialties other than family medicine in the United States 19 who currently cannot join as AAFP supporting members, and 20 21 WHEREAS, these international family physicians may already be participating as World 22 Organization of Family Doctors (WONCA) members, but because they are in a residency other 23 than family medicine they cannot join as supporting members despite also being family 24 physicians, and 25 26 WHEREAS, allowing residents from other specialties to participate as supporting members 27 allows them to learn more about family medicine and contribute to our specialty, and 28 29 WHEREAS, each year there are residents in other specialties who transfer or who are 30 considering transfer to a family medicine residency, now, therefore, be it 31 32 RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians offer supporting membership to resident physicians previously trained in family medicine who are currently in non-family 33 34 medicine residency programs.

There are various levels of understanding in the public regarding the training and 12 scope of practice of family medicine physicians, and 13 14 WHEREAS, social media has evolved significantly over the last 10 years in regards to 15 advertising and platform, and 16 17 WHEREAS, there are continued pushes for increased scope of practice for non-physician 18 primary care health care providers across the country, and 19 20 WHEREAS, this resolution could evolve to collaborate with other primary care physician 21 organizations to promote physician led care, and 22 23 WHEREAS, the last time a resolution regarding a media campaign was proposed was in 2010 24 (Resolution 214) and was never adopted and social media advertising has changed significantly 25 since that time, now, therefore, be it 26 27 RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians launch an indefinite media 28 campaign including but not limited to various social media platforms, national and local news 29 channels, and print media using resources already available through sources such as: American Academy of Family Physicians public relations, "Health is Primary," American Medical 30 31 Association, and Primary Care Coalition to promote the value and scope of family physicians. 32 now, be it further 33 34 RESOLVED, That this media campaign would be developed to promote the value and scope of 35 family physicians as well as highlight the difference in training between physicians and various 36 other health care providers including nurse practitioners, physician assistants, and 37 chiropractors.

1 Resolution NO. 4006 2 3 Intersectionality at the American Academy of Family Physicians National Conference of 4 **Constituency Leaders** 5 6 Submitted by: Lisa Lavadie-Gomez, MD, Minority 7 Shanda Dorff, MD, Minority 8 Srikala Yedavally-Yellayi, DO, Minority 9 Shanda Colon-Gonzalez, MD, Minority 10 Jean Lu, MD, Minority 11 12 WHEREAS, The American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) created the National 13 Conference of Constituency Leaders (NCCL) to more effectively integrate the perspectives and 14 concerns of Academy members from the special constituencies to the benefit of an increasingly 15 diverse membership and patient population, and 16 17 WHEREAS, many members self-identify within multiple constituencies, and 18 19 WHEREAS, intersectionality recognizes how multiple social identities (LGBT, Minority, New 20 Physicians, IMG, Women) overlap at micro and macro levels of individual experience to reflect 21 the relationships between systems of privilege and oppression, and 22 23 WHEREAS, using the framework of intersectionality is posited to have a large impact on public 24 health issues that affect AAFP members and our patients, and 25 26 WHEREAS, we understand the importance of how multiple identity experiences impact and 27 inform health care education and delivery, now, therefore, be it 28 29 RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians promote intersectional 30 collaboration within members of the special constituencies by providing a link, within the 31 conference confirmation registration email, to a unified member constituency online community 32 to facilitate idea sharing that spans across constituencies and to optimize resolution writing at 33 the National Conference of Constituency Leaders meeting.

Facilitating Gender Pronouns on Nametags and Electronic Registration at All AAFP Events

WHEREAS, Transgender, gender non-conforming, and gender non-binary individuals are more likely to experience both explicit and implicit discrimination and abuse resulting in severe psychological stress and worse health outcomes due to their gender identity, and

WHEREAS, medical students, residents, and physicians who identify along the gender spectrum identify family medicine as one of the most inclusive specialties, and

WHEREAS, in 2016, an estimated 0.6% or about 1.4 million people in the United States self-identified as transgender, and

WHEREAS, individuals who identify as transgender, gender non-conforming, or gender non-binary may have specific pronoun(s) to be used upon referencing their person that may or may not be readily assumed or known on presentation, and

WHEREAS, we as family physicians should strive to create a safe space for learning and collaboration among our community of diverse family doctors across the country without gender diverse individuals being subjected to marginalizing language, and

WHEREAS, the 2017 Commission on Membership and Member Services added a question specifically about gender identity to the American Academy of Family Physicians annual Member Census Survey, and

WHEREAS, in 2018, a policy was created to ensure that at the National Conference of Constituency Leaders (NCCL), the AAFP will begin including preferred pronouns upon badges starting in 2019, and

WHEREAS, a resolution was endorsed at NCCL to allow registrants for all AAFP-sponsored events and conferences to select their own preferred pronouns of address to be visible on registrant badges, and

WHEREAS, having transgender, gender non-conforming, and gender non-binary individuals be the only participants to include their preferred pronoun is marginalizing, now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians have all individuals identify their preferred pronouns upon event registration, including printed pronouns on name badges, at all AAFP-sponsored events and conferences, and be it further

- RESOLVED, That gender pronouns be an option on all American Academy of Family Physicians future registration interfaces.

1 Resolution NO. 4008 2 3 International Medical Graduate Comprehensive Section on the American Academy of 4 **Family Physicians Website** 5 6 Submitted by: Brenainn Flanagan, MD, International Medical Graduates 7 Timothy Yu, MD, International Medical Graduates 8 9 WHEREAS, One in four physicians practicing in the United States are trained at a foreign 10 medical school, 41% of these practicing are active International Medical Graduates in primary 11 care, and 12 13 WHEREAS, approximately 14,000 of the 70,000 active members of the American Academy of 14 Family Physicians (AAFP) are international medical graduates which represent 30 percent of 15 the active members, and 16 17 WHEREAS, currently, there is no designated site on the AAFP website providing assistance, establishing awareness, identifying opportunities and providing resources for international 18 medical graduates, now, therefore, be it 19 20 21 RESOLVED, That the American Academy of Family Physicians, when revamping its website, 22 include members of each constituency for the creation of its website section.
