I. Purpose and Objectives of the National Conference of Constituency Leaders (NCCL)

A. Purpose

The National Conference of Constituency Leaders (NCCL), first held in 1990 as the National Conference of Women, Minority and New Physicians (NCWMNP), is a vehicle to more effectively integrate the perspectives and concerns of AAFP members from underrepresented constituencies, to the benefit of an increasingly diverse membership and patient population. The NCCL is designed to focus on, and give impetus to, the perspectives and special concerns of grassroots members from the constituency groups.

B. Objectives

1. To provide an opportunity for Board-approved member constituencies [currently Women; Minority; New Physicians; International Medical Graduates (IMG); and LGBTQ+ physicians] and other emerging constituencies to become more familiar with AAFP programs, exchange information, share experiences, develop basic leadership skills, and to encourage participation in the AAFP governance structure at both the local and national levels.
2. To provide a forum whereby the Board of Directors may be better informed as to the concerns of the constituency groups and discuss with them priorities for AAFP activities.
3. To provide an opportunity for these groups to identify issues of particular concern to family physicians and to make specific recommendations by way of resolutions to the AAFP's Board of Directors and Congress of Delegates.
4. To allow the New Physicians constituency to elect a nominee for the New Physician Member of the Board of Directors.
5. To allow the New Physicians constituency to elect two Alternate Delegates, in accordance with the AAFP Bylaws, who serve one year in that capacity before succeeding to the position of Delegate in the following Congress of Delegates.
6. To allow all New Physicians present (no matter which constituency they are in attendance to represent) to elect two Delegates to the American Medical Association's Young Physicians Section (AMA-YPS).
7. To allow the Women; Minority; IMG; and LGBTQ+ constituencies to elect six Member Constituency Alternate Delegates, in accordance with the AAFP Bylaws, who serve one year in that capacity before succeeding to the position of Delegate in the following Congress. The constituency Delegates and Alternate Delegates represent the views of the grassroots constituency members in the debate and decisions of the Congress of Delegates.

II. NCCL Business Procedures

A. The business of the NCCL shall be conducted annually.

1. Attendance

- 54 a. Any member of the AAFP may register for and attend the conference as a General
55 Registrant. Chapters may specify an active member to be a Chapter Delegate for
56 each of the Board-approved constituencies.
- 57
- 58 b. The member constituencies are defined as follows for the purposes of the
59 conference:
- 60
- 61 i. *Women* physicians are those who self-identify as women.
- 62
- 63 ii. *Minority* physicians are defined as they are by the U.S. Census Bureau: African
64 American, Asian, Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander, American Indian,
65 Alaska Native, ethnic Latino, Other.
- 66
- 67 iii. *New Physicians* are those who completed residency or extended training
68 immediately following residency seven years ago or less. Individuals who
69 graduate from a residency program but who enter a fellowship continue in the
70 resident member status until completion of their fellowship, whereupon they
71 become active members. For those individuals, the seven-year time period for
72 purpose of New Physician Board member eligibility would not begin upon
73 graduation from their residency program, but rather they would have seven
74 years after completion of their fellowship.

- 76 iv. *IMGs* are graduates from a medical school outside of the United States,
77 Canada and Puerto Rico.
- 78
- 79 v. *LGBTQ+* physicians are those who self-identify as LGBTQ+ or who are
80 supportive of LGBTQ+ issues.
- 81
- 82 c. Chapter Delegates
- 83
- 84 i. Chapter Delegates must be members in the Active AAFP membership
85 classification only. Chapter Delegates are designated by chapters for each of
86 the Board-approved member constituency groups. They must meet the
87 definition of the constituency group they represent, and their member
88 classification must be Active the first day of the conference with dues paid in
89 full or be enrolled in the installment payment plan to be eligible to serve.
90 Chapter Delegates may serve on Reference or Tellers Committees, submit
91 resolutions, testify in all reference committee hearings, testify and vote on
92 resolutions in the business sessions, and vote in the Co-Convener, Alternate
93 Delegate, and/or Delegate elections.
- 94
- 95 ii. Chapters may seek out individuals to send from their jurisdiction or they may
96 take requests for consideration from interested individuals. Co-Conveners may
97 come as a Chapter Delegate for their chapter but are only eligible to come for
98 the constituency that they have been elected to represent.
- 99
- 100 iii. A Chapter Delegate may be replaced on site by a General Registrant from the
101 same chapter if the General Registrant meets the criteria for that constituency.
102 A request for such a substitution must come from both the General Registrant
103 and Chapter Executive directly to the NCCL Conference Strategist. At the time
104 of substitution, voting privileges will be revoked from the original member and
105 given to the replacement.
- 106
- 107 iv. A Chapter Delegate may change the constituency they have been named to
108 represent only if the Chapter Delegate meets the definition of the constituency

group they wish to represent, and the chapter does not already have a representative for the constituency group he/she wishes to represent. A request for such a change must come from the Chapter Executive directly to the NCCL Conference Manager and must occur prior to the first business session of NCCL. At the time of change, all voting privileges are, then, restricted to the member constituency group the Chapter Delegate represents until the close of NCCL.

d. General Registrants

- i. General Registrants may contribute to the discussions, run for office if they are an AAFP member in the Active membership category and meet the definitions and requirements, volunteer for the Reference or Tellers Committees, co-sponsor resolutions (if endorsed by at least two Chapter Delegates), and testify on policy issues during any of the NCCL reference committees and business sessions. They may not vote on policy issues, make motions or propose amendments during the NCCL business session, or vote in any AAFP Delegate, Alternate Delegate, or Co-Convener elections. If qualified, they will be allowed to vote in the AMA-YPS Delegate election.
- ii. General Registrants, in the Active membership category only, will be allowed to fill open constituency slots for their chapter as long as they meet the definition of the constituency group they intend to represent and have dues paid in full or are enrolled in the installment payment plan. A request must come from the Chapter Executive directly to the Member Engagement and Governance Strategist. General Registrants will only be allowed to fill open constituency slots for the chapter in which they are members in good standing.
- iii. Members in the Supporting, Inactive, Life, Transitional, Resident, and Student membership classifications may not come as a Chapter Delegate; however, these members are encouraged to attend as General Registrants to the conference. They may contribute to the discussions, co-sponsor resolutions (if endorsed by at least two Chapter Delegates) and testify on policy issues during any of the NCCL reference committees and business session. They may not vote in any elections or serve on the Tellers Committee; however, they may volunteer as an observer for a reference committee.

- B. A majority (one more than half) of the total registered Chapter Delegates shall constitute a quorum at any business session of the NCCL.
- C. The most current edition of The American Institute of Parliamentarians, *The Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure* shall govern all proceedings of the NCCL, except when in conflict with the AAFP Bylaws or specific provisions of these Rules of Order.
- D. The NCCL Convener will serve as Chair and shall preside over the business sessions with assistance at their discretion.
- E. Reference committees shall be appointed by the NCCL Convener to facilitate the work of the NCCL. Whenever possible, the NCCL will follow the same protocols as the AAFP Congress of Delegates. Reference committee hearings will be staggered, to be scheduled on such days and at such times to be determined by the NCCL Convener. Reference committees will operate according to the document on "Powers and Duties of Reference Committees."

- F. Resolutions must be presented in writing by the published deadline. To be considered for introduction to a reference committee, submitted resolutions must be endorsed by at least two NCCL Chapter Delegates.
- A maximum of 50 resolutions will be accepted for consideration. Each constituency may submit up to 10 resolutions. The determination of which constituency submitted the resolution will be based on the constituency represented by the chapter delegate serving as the resolution's primary author.
- Upon submission, the current Member Engagement and Governance Strategist will determine the ultimate designation of which reference committee will act on a resolution. This determination will consider (a) the relevance of the issue to the various topics, (b) the possible grouping of like issues for consideration, and (c) the relative workload for each of the reference committees. Each resolution will be referred to only one reference committee.
- It is the discretion of the business session to determine the relevance of the reference committee recommendation for referral destination; however, the CMMS has ultimate approval of any referrals to the Congress of Delegates. If the CMMS determines, based on a pre-determined criterion set forth in the supplemental document, Powers and Duties of Reference Committees, that a referral does not belong with the Congress of Delegates, it will, instead, refer the resolution to the Board of Directors.
- G. Any resolution not previously discussed in a reference committee must be typed or legibly printed and presented to the NCCL Convener no later than 6:00 p.m. on the evening prior to the start of the first business session. The Late Resolutions Committee (comprised of the NCCL Convener and Reference Committee Chairs) will then review such resolutions. It is within the discretion of this committee to recommend whether the business session should consider the introduction, based on whether it contains timely, pertinent, and new information.
- Prior to the start of the business session's scheduled agenda, the recommendation of the Late Resolutions Committee will be announced. Two-thirds (2/3) of the registered Chapter Delegates present must vote in favor of allowing the late resolution for it to be introduced and considered. Once a resolution is accepted by the NCCL, it "belongs" to the conference which then has the authority to wordsmith the language, when appropriate, for better understanding.
- Late resolutions shall be considered in the order received, except that the NCCL Convener reserves the right to determine the order of business based on the importance of the issues and the amount of time available for discussion.
- H. All conference registrants may have the privilege of the floor and engage in debate after being recognized by the Chair.
- I. No one shall speak more than once on any issue or separate motion until all who wish to speak have been heard. No one shall speak more than twice without permission of the Chair or by majority vote of the NCCL.
- J. Debate on a single issue shall be limited to two minutes per speaker and no more than 15 minutes overall, except by permission of the Chair or by majority vote of the NCCL, provided both sides have been represented on the debate.
- K. All Chapter Delegates may vote on policy issues and in elections during the business sessions.

219 L. Amending motions on the floor of the NCCL is limited to first order amendments only.
220
221 M. Passage of a motion during the business sessions requires a majority vote (one more than
222 half of the total registered Chapter Delegates) except for motions which require greater
223 than a majority as specified in *The Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure*, current
224 edition. All motions require a second. The Chair may conduct a head-count at any time
225 during the business sessions to verify the number of Chapter Delegates present. If there is
226 not a majority present, all voting must be suspended until a later time or subsequent
227 meeting.
228
229 N. Voting shall be by voice, “yes” and “no”, except where the NCCL Convener or a Chapter
230 Delegate calls for a division, in which case a standing, hand, written, or electronic vote
231 shall be taken.
232
233 O. There are various opportunities for volunteer leadership at the NCCL. These opportunities
234 allow participation in reference committees, the Tellers Committee, and as
235 Parliamentarian. Appointments for these volunteer positions will be solicited via an NCCL
236 volunteer service application form. Appointments for these positions will be made by the
237 NCCL Convener and announced on site at the NCCL.
238
239 P. In the event that any business remains unfinished at the conclusion of the NCCL, the
240 protocol listed herein shall be followed:
241
242 1. If a late resolution(s) has been accepted by the NCCL but is not addressed during the
243 meeting, the resolution(s) will be placed on the appropriate reference committee
244 agenda the following year for vetting. At least one of the original resolution authors
245 must be in attendance the following year in order for the resolution to be considered.
246
247 2. If a resolution(s) has been presented on a reference committee agenda but is not
248 addressed during the meeting, the resolution(s) will be placed as old business on the
249 business session agenda the following year to be addressed before any new business.
250 All relevant background material will be provided to the NCCL attendees.
251
252 Q. Rules of Order and Parliamentary Procedure.
253
254 1. The Rules of Order shall govern all parliamentary proceedings of the NCCL except
255 when in conflict with the AAFP Bylaws. The NCCL Convener is responsible for
256 enforcement of parliamentary procedure according to the Rules of Order. Further
257 interpretation of these procedures, as necessary, will be made by the NCCL Convener,
258 utilizing the most current edition of The American Institute of Parliamentarians, *The*
259 *Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure*.
260
261 2. Recommendations to amend the Rules of Order will be made by the Commission on
262 Membership and Member Services to the Board of Directors for their approval.
263

264 III. Rules of Election
265

- 266 A. A Tellers Committee will be comprised of one member from each constituency appointed
267 by the NCCL Convener. This group oversees all elections, works with staff to collect
268 ballots, tallies votes, and relays results to the constituency Caucus or Business Session
269 Chair, and may be called upon during the business sessions to assist with any hand or
270 written votes. Members of the Tellers Committee must not be running for any office during
271 the conference.
272

- 273 B. AAFP Bylaws authorize the seating of two Delegates and two Alternate Delegates at the
274 AAFP Congress of Delegates from the New Physicians constituency (with no sunset date)
275 and six Delegates and six Alternate Delegates from the remaining four Member
276 Constituencies (with a sunset date of 2025). Each constituency, except for New
277 Physicians will elect two Co-Conveners for the following year's conference. These
278 individuals will also become candidates for the elections of six constituency Alternate
279 Delegates (or Delegates, if necessary) the following day.

280
281 AAFP Bylaws authorize the election of one candidate for the New Physician Director on
282 the Board of Directors for a one-year term. The candidate must then be approved by the
283 Congress of Delegates to be seated on the Board of Directors.
284

- 285 C. The following elections will be held in conjunction with the NCCL:
286

- 287 1. One Convener (for the subsequent NCCL)
- 288
- 289 2. One new physician nominee for the Board of Directors
- 290
- 291 3. Eight Co-Conveners (two each for the Women, Minority, IMG, and LGBTQ+
- 292 constituencies) for NCCL the following year
- 293
- 294 4. Six Member Constituency Alternate Delegates to the AAFP Congress of Delegates
- 295 who will serve as Delegates the following year
- 296
- 297 5. Two New Physicians Alternate Delegates to the AAFP Congress of Delegates who will
- 298 serve as Delegates to the Congress of Delegates as well as Co-Convener for NCCL
- 299 the following year
- 300
- 301 6. One Delegate to the AMA Young Physicians Section (YPS)
- 302

- 303 D. Voting Delegates.
304

- 305 1. Only those conference registrants who are designated by their chapter as a Chapter
- 306 Delegate to a constituency will be given ballot packets to vote for NCCL Convener, Co-
- 307 Conveners, and Alternate Delegates (and Delegates if necessary) for that
- 308 constituency.
- 309
- 310 2. Only those conference registrants who are designated by their chapter as a Chapter
- 311 Delegate to the New Physicians constituency will be given ballot packets to vote for
- 312 the New Physician candidate for the Board of Directors.
- 313
- 314 3. All conference registrants who meet the AAFP definition of a New Physician (whether
- 315 coming as a Chapter Delegate or General Registrant) will be given ballot packets to
- 316 vote for the AAFP's AMA-YPS Delegate.
- 317

- 318 E. Election Criteria.
319

- 320 1. NCCL Convener
- 321
- 322 a. The requirements to run for the NCCL Convener are as follows: must be an AAFP
- 323 member in the Active membership category and meet a constituency definition at
- 324 the time of the meeting they will convene.
- 325
- 326 b. Candidates must have been in attendance at the NCCL or Annual Chapter Leader
- 327 Forum within the past three years and must have previously served as a Co-

328 Convener or Delegate or Alternate Delegate for the Member Constituencies or
329 New Physicians.

- 330
- 331 c. Candidates may not serve as a constituency Delegate in the following Congress of
332 Delegates.
- 333
- 334 d. No more than three candidates for NCCL Convener will be nominated from a pool
335 of applicants by the Commission on Membership and Member Services and ratified
336 by the Board Chair prior to NCCL for placement on the ballot.
- 337

338 2. New Physician Nominee for the AAFP Board of Directors.

339

- 340 a. The requirements to run for the New Physician seat are as follows: must be an
341 AAFP member in the Active membership category, first eligible for Active
342 membership in the AAFP fewer than seven years before being elected at the
343 NCCL, and not currently nor have ever served as the Student, Resident, or New
344 Physician Board member.
- 345
- 346 b. Candidates must have also previously attended at least one NCCL, be in
347 attendance at the NCCL during which they are running for the position (as a
348 General Registrant or Chapter Delegate to any constituency, provided the criteria
349 for the new physicians constituency is met), and submit a form declaring their
350 candidacy accompanied by a curriculum vitae and a letter of endorsement from
351 their chapter by the designated deadline.
- 352
- 353 c. Candidates cannot run for other offices (AMA-YPS Delegate or Board approved
354 constituency Co-Conveners) during the same NCCL.
- 355
- 356 d. Pursuant to the AAFP Bylaws, the elected candidate's name shall be presented to
357 the AAFP Congress of Delegates for approval. If the Congress of Delegates fails to
358 approve the candidate, the AAFP Board of Directors shall select the New Physician
359 Board member by majority vote.
- 360
- 361 e. The term of office for the New Physician Board Member shall begin at the
362 conclusion of the annual meeting of the Congress of Delegates and expire at the
363 conclusion of the next annual meeting of the Congress of Delegates.
- 364

365 3. Constituency Co-Convener.

366

- 367 a. The requirements to run for the Co-Convener positions are as follows: must be an
368 AAFP member in the Active membership category, must be in attendance at the
369 NCCL (as a General Registrant, provided the criteria for the constituency is met, or
370 Chapter Delegate to the constituency), must declare as a candidate for Co-
371 Convener for only one specific constituency, and meet the criteria for that
372 constituency.
- 373
- 374 b. Candidates must submit a form declaring their candidacy accompanied by a
375 curriculum vitae by the designated deadline. Members may seek chapter support
376 for their candidacy, but they do not need to be nominated by their chapter, nor do
377 they need to be a Chapter Delegate to the NCCL to run.
- 378
- 379 c. In the event an open Co-Convener slot(s) needs to be filled and that person is not
380 serving as an Alternate Delegate, the person receiving the third highest number of
381 votes at the previous year's NCCL constituency elections will be asked to serve.
- 382

- 383 4. Member Constituency Alternate Delegate to the Congress of Delegates.
384
385 a. To qualify for the Member Constituency Alternate Delegate positions, an individual
386 must have been elected as a Constituency Co-Convener at the current year's
387 NCCL.
388
389 b. No individual shall be prohibited from being elected to a second term as a Member
390 Constituency Alternate Delegate and Delegate. However, no individual may serve
391 a cumulative total of more than four years as a Member Constituency Alternate
392 Delegate and Delegate.
393
394 c. In the event open slots need to be filled (due to election of higher office, etc.):
395
396 i. If openings occur between the time of the NCCL and the time the Congress of
397 Delegates meets, nominations will be solicited from the Commission on
398 Membership and Member Services. Nominees will, then, be presented to the
399 Board Chair, who will designate the successor.
400
401 ii. If open slots occur between the time of the Congress of Delegates and the time
402 the NCCL meets, the slots will be filled by election at the subsequent NCCL.
403 Those eligible to run for the open slot are the Co-Conveners not elected
404 Alternate Delegates at the previous year's NCCL and those Co-Conveners not
405 elected Alternate Delegates at the current year's NCCL provided that each
406 constituency has no more than two delegates.
407
408 5. New Physicians Alternate Delegates to the Congress of Delegates (and Co-
409 Convener).
410
411 a. The requirements to run for the Alternate Delegate positions are as follows: must
412 be an AAFP member in the Active membership category who was first eligible for
413 Active membership fewer than seven years before serving as Co-Convener for
414 NCCL, must be in attendance at the NCCL (as a General Registrant, provided the
415 criteria for the constituency is met, or Chapter Delegate to the constituency), must
416 declare as a candidate for Co-Convener, Alternate Delegate, or Delegate for only
417 one specific constituency, and meet the criteria for that constituency.
418
419 b. Candidates must submit a form declaring their candidacy accompanied by a
420 curriculum vitae by the designated deadline. Members may seek chapter support
421 for their candidacy, but they do not need to be nominated by their chapter, nor do
422 they need to be a Chapter Delegate to the NCCL to run.
423
424 c. In the event open slots need to be filled (due to election of higher office, etc.):
425
426 i. If openings occur between the time of the NCCL and the time the Congress of
427 Delegates meets, nominations will be solicited from the Commission on
428 Membership and Member Services. Precedence will be given to others who ran
429 for the office at the previous year's NCCL in order of total votes. Nominees will,
430 then, be presented to the Board Chair, who will designate the successor.
431
432 ii. If open slots occur between the time of the Congress of Delegates and the time
433 the NCCL meets, the slots will be filled by election at the subsequent NCCL.
434 Those eligible to run for the open slot are the Co-Conveners not elected
435 Alternate Delegates at the previous year's NCCL and those Co-Conveners not
436 elected Alternate Delegates at the current year's NCCL provided that each
437 constituency has no more than two delegates.

- iii. If an opening occurs for the Alternate Delegate seat only between the time of the NCCL and the time the Congress of Delegates meets, the New Physicians delegation will appoint a replacement Alternate Delegate. Precedence will be given to others who ran for the office at the previous year's NCCL in order of total votes. This individual will serve during the Congress of Delegates only and will not have any official duties as Co-Convener or Delegate after serving as Alternate Delegate.

- a. The AAFP Delegates to the AMA-YPS will serve a term of two years with one position rotating off each year. There will be no restrictions on the total number of years an individual may serve provided all AAFP and AMA eligibility criteria is met.
 - b. To be eligible to run for the AMA-YPS Delegate positions, an individual must: be registered for and in attendance at NCCL (as a General Registrant or Chapter Delegate to any constituency, provided the criteria for AMA-YPS Delegate is met), be an AAFP member in the Active membership category, first eligible for Active membership in the AAFP less than seven years before election, be an Active member of the AMA, and be under 40 years of age or within the first eight years in practice. AMA criteria must be met throughout the term of service, not just at the time of election.
 - c. Candidates not elected in previously-held Co-Convener elections, regardless of constituency, provided the criteria for AMA-YPS Delegate are met, may declare candidacy for AMA-YPS Delegate. Candidates must notify the NCCL Conference Manager of intent to run by the deadline set forth in the NCCL *Election Procedures* in order to qualify and be placed on the ballot.
 - d. The AAFP Board of Directors will be notified of those persons elected to Delegate positions for ratification.
 - e. If an AMA-YPS vacancy occurs between the time of the NCCL and the time that the next AMA meeting is held, nominations to fill the vacancy will be solicited from the Commission on Membership and Member Services. These names will be submitted to the Board Chair, who will designate the successor.

F. Election Guidelines.

- 1. Election procedures at the conference parallel those used by the AAFP Congress of Delegates set forth in the Bylaws. The specific procedures outlined here will be used in conducting elections for the NCCL Convener, Member Constituency Co-Conveners, Delegates and Alternate Delegates, and for the New Physician nominee for the Board of Directors.
 - 2. Printed campaign materials (brochures, buttons, etc.) beyond the standard information prepared by NCCL staff are strictly prohibited. Candidates may utilize social media for the purpose of campaigning prior to and during NCCL provided the *AAFP Guidelines: Using Social Media when Campaigning for Leadership Positions* is followed:

The AAFP embraces the use of social media for member/organizational communications, and AAFP provides formal social media channels for this purpose. These channels (including but not limited to Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, and LinkedIN) are not to be used for personal use, including the posting of messages

493 selling products, recruiting, political campaigning or endorsements, promoting
494 commercial or other ventures, or any messages perceived as spam. This includes the
495 campaigning by members for AAFP leadership positions at the National Conference of
496 Constituency Leaders, National Congress of Family Medicine Residents, National
497 Congress of Student Members, and Congress of Delegates. These guidelines are
498 posted online, and any comments that violate these guidelines will be removed.
499 Regarding Twitter, the AAFP has no objections to candidates using the official event
500 hashtag in any messages from their personal account, including campaign messages.
501

502 Please note: this restriction applies only to the official AAFP social media channels; the
503 use of personal social media accounts is at each member's own discretion.
504

- 505 3. Deadlines for acquiring and submitting constituency Co-Convener and Alternate
506 Delegate ballots will be provided to each participant on site.
- 507
- 508 4. The candidates shall draw for the order in which they shall speak for election.
509
- 510 5. No ballot shall be counted in any election if it contains more votes or fewer votes than
511 were instructed to be cast or if the votes are presented on the incorrect ballot.
512
- 513 6. Run-off elections will be conducted as necessary.
514

517 designated by their chapter to serve as the Chapter Delegate for the constituency

521 and subsequent year's NCCL Convener will be conducted by the current constituency

 - 544 c. Balloting will take place during each constituency caucus the following day. A
545 formal announcement of the winner will be made during lunch the same day as
546 balloting. (Candidates will be notified immediately to facilitate the mentoring
547 process.)

- 549 d. The NCCL Convener shall be elected by majority vote of those eligible, present,
- 550 and voting. Any candidate who receives a majority of the votes cast shall be
- 551 elected. If there is no candidate that receives a majority of the votes cast on the

- 553 majority.

- 587 Conveners for the following year's NCCL. (These eight individuals become
- 588 candidates for the six Member Constituency Alternate Delegate seats (and
- 589 Delegate seats if necessary) to the Congress of Delegates.)

- 591 c. The new physicians caucus will elect two Alternate Delegates for the Congress of
- 592 Delegates. At the meeting of the AAFP Congress of Delegates immediately
- 593 following their election, these two individuals shall serve as Alternate Delegates. At

607 receives a majority of the votes cast shall be elected.

609 If both positions remain to be filled after the first or a subsequent ballot, no more
610 than four candidates receiving the largest number of votes cast on the preceding
611 ballot, plus those tying for one of the top four positions, shall be candidates on the
612 next ballot. Any candidate who receives a majority of the votes cast on such
613 subsequent ballots and who is one of the two candidates receiving the largest
614 number of votes shall be elected.

616 If one vacancy remains to be filled after the first or a subsequent ballot, the two
617 candidates receiving the largest number of votes on the preceding ballot, plus
618 those tying for one of the top two positions, shall be candidates on the next ballot.
619 The candidate who receives a majority of the votes cast on such subsequent
620 ballots shall be elected.

629 b. Chapter Delegates representing the women, minority, IMG, and LGBTQ+
630 constituencies will elect six Alternate Delegates for the AAFP Congress of
631 Delegates. (The previously elected eight Co-Conveners for the women, minority,
632 IMG, and LGBT constituencies are automatically placed on the ballot as
633 candidates for the Member Constituency Alternate Delegate seats.) At the meeting
634 of the AAFP Congress of Delegates immediately following their election, these six
635 individuals shall serve as Alternate Delegates. At the conclusion of that annual
636 meeting, they shall assume the position of the AAFP Delegates and will continue in
637 that position until their term expires at the conclusion of the next ensuing annual
638 meeting of the AAFP Congress of Delegates.
