FMIG Operation

The UCR Family & Preventative Medicine Interest Group(FPMIG) introduces students to the opportunities and philosophies of family and preventive medicine through various interactive and educational experiences in the UCR community and beyond. Some of which include mentorship opportunities, training in vital clinical and history-taking skills, presentations from multiple family physician members in Riverside, as well as community outreach events. We hope to continue expanding and providing additional opportunities for UCR medical students through future partnerships with AAFP.

There are two co-presidents, one historian, and one scheduling coordinator at the UCR Family & Preventative Medicine Interest Group. The co-presidents are in charge of applying for grants, brainstorming and executing ideas, working with school administration to ensure smooth operation of our events, networking with community leaders, and finding community service opportunities for the interest group. While many of our roles overlap, the historian is primarily in charge of documenting FPMIG events and sending thank you notes to FPMIG event guests. The scheduling coordinator serves as a liaison between our group and the scheduling office at the UCR School of Medicine. They play a valuable role in ensuring our events are approved and that students interested in family medicine are invited to attend the events.

Goals

The primary goal of our FPMIG chapter is to serve as an introduction to Family & Preventative Medicine. We strive to create a space for discussions about the range of options available through family medicine and the importance of family & preventative medicine in promoting health both on an individual and community level. We achieve this goal by creating networking opportunities for students to meet and learn from local family medicine practitioners. We also provide workshops for participants to practice hands-on techniques and interact with skilled professionals. We would also like to host events to facilitate any discussion related to the field and scope of practice to not only inspire future physicians but also to raise awareness of the importance of family & preventative medicine.

We also present our FPMIG chapter as an important avenue for engaging in community service and mentoring activities. Each year, we provide our peers with community service events that are in clinical and non-clinical settings, namely administering flu shots, delivering meals to the elderly population, food/can-drive, etc. We view this as an important opportunity for our peers to learn about the health needs of our community while engaging with community leaders and advocates.

Faculty Advisor

As UCR FPMIG Faculty Advisor, Dr. Nathan McLaughlin checks in with us every month to provide guidance, inspire us with more ideas, and helps us find speakers for events/workshops with his network. As a physician specializing in Family Medicine and is involved tremendously with the Riverside community, whether in the hospital settings or at the Riverside free clinic, he has all the qualifications and experiences to serve as a great resource. Dr. McLaughlin's commitment to the success of our FMIG also involves him serving as a speaker at our upcoming event, "Exploring the Community Health Needs in Riverside." Our FPMIG chapter also facilitates Problem Based Learning exercises with local under-resourced high schools. Our FPMIG chose to pursue this event because it would create an incredible opportunity to work with young students within our community and inspire those currently under-represented in the medical field to pursue a career in medicine. Our group played a crucial role in contacting local high schools, working with their high school administrators, and recruiting medical students for this event. We were also responsible for providing medical students with Problem-Based Learning guides and offering the high school students advice on how to best approach their prospective medical case. The Problem Based Learning case involved problems commonly seen in family medicine clinics such as hypertension, obesity, and COVID-19. The success of this program was evaluated in not just the number of high school students and medical students we were able to recruit but also in the number of high school students who reached out to us after the event.

We plan on continuing this event throughout the next school year. To ensure the continued success, we plan on collaborating with other student interest groups on campus to expand the scale of our events and increase the number of participants to guarantee a more successful outcome.

Primary Care Summit is a collaboration event with a few other student interest groups, namely Pediatrics, Medical Students for Choice, Organized Medicine, & Internal Medicine, and other institutions such as Western University & CalMed.
