Will surgical specialists be able to change payments next year? According to an American Medical Association (AMA) estimate, the approved payment is a 13% increase.	Surgical specialists are aggressively pushing Congress to waive budget neutrality to address looming cuts and have pressed for a delay of implementation of January 1, 2021. Congress overwhelmingly supports the implementation of the fee schedule and is considering ways to provide targeted relief to physicians, but the challenge is the cost of making changes and precedence for future action by Congress. The AAFP and other primary care physician



	groups are pressing Congress to implement the fee schedule on January 1. Should they provide relief, it should not pick certain specialties over others.
