

Family physicians are residency-trained, primary care specialists dedicated to treating the whole person. They treat babies with ear infections, adolescents with hypertension, adults with depression, and seniors with multiple chronic illnesses. With a focus on prevention, primary care, and overall care coordination, they provide a wide variety of clinical services, and, when necessary, refer their patients to the right specialist and advocate for their care.^{1,2,3}

Physician Shortage in Mississippi

Due to an aging, growing, and increasingly insured population, addressing both physician shortages and geographic maldistribution of PCPs requires analysis and action on the state level.^{4,5}

Primary Care in the U.S. Health Care System
