Steps to **harmonize value-based care and quality improvement efforts** among different payers



Reforms to the **Graduate Medical Education program** to support the education and training of primary care physicians



Research on the value of primary care and its role in pandemic preparedness and improving health equity.

Advancing primary care includes efforts that are comprehensive of **delivery systems, connected to other health and community services, equitable to all**, and **mindful of socioeconomic factors** that may hinder access to primary care.
