Dear Dr. Babin:

On behalf of our organizations, we thank you for introducing the “Resident Education Deferred Interest Act” (HR 5734) that, if passed, will allow interest-free deferment on student loans for borrowers serving in a medical or dental residency program.

As a dentist, you are likely aware the cost of graduate-level medical and dental education is substantial for the vast majority of students. Further, those who undertake several years of residency with very low pay are often unable to begin repaying student debt immediately. As a result, they qualify to have their payments halted during residency through deferment or forbearance processes, but they continue to accrue interest that is added to their balance.

Passage of the “Resident Education Deferred Interest Act” is an important part of student loan repayment reform. This bill would save physicians and dentists in residency thousands of dollars in interest. Providing interest accrual relief during residency also would make the concepts of opening practices in underserved areas or entering faculty or research more attractive and affordable to residents.
