Hospitalization and the transition of care period following discharge are often a very vulnerable time for patients, particularly those who are high risk. There are many opportunities for confusion, miscommunication, and errors for patients and their caregivers during this time. In addition to improving patient outcomes and experiences, there is also an opportunity for education of residents regarding successful transitions of care.
